YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAM  
Club Manual**

**PART 5: SHORT TERM EXCHANGE**

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**NOTE:** Forms are listed on the Index with a Document Reference # of 5.51 and higher. These form documents are separated as individual documents in order to facilitate printing and completing the forms. Many are fillable and savable pdf forms and therefore cannot be combined with the other sections into a single document.

## **5.01 Short Term Exchange in District 5080**

The first short term exchange in D-5080 took place in the summer of 2001 with a girl from Creston, BC matched with a girl from Lissone, Italy.

### **Purpose**

The purpose of the Rotary District 5080 Short Term Exchange Program is:

1. To promote international peace, goodwill and understanding through a sixty-day family-to-family international exchange.
2. To provide the opportunity for students from within Rotary District 5080 (age 15-19) to experience international travel and spend thirty days living with a foreign host family.
3. To provide the opportunity for foreign students to experience international travel and spend a reciprocal thirty days living with the families of their US/Canadian counterparts.

This program is ideal for students who are looking for an international exchange experience during the summer.

### **How the Program Works**

The program is designed as a family-to-family exchange. A student from within our Rotary district is matched with a student in a Rotary district in Europe or South America. The match is based on the applicant's age, gender, country preference and, to some extent, interests. The US/Canadian student spends thirty days with the foreign student and his/her family, and the foreign student spends a reciprocal thirty days with the US/Canadian student and his/her family.

The sixty-day exchange period begins in mid-June and extends to the middle of August. For most of our outbound students, the first thirty days will be spent abroad and the last thirty days will be spent hosting their European or South American counterparts.

Our program provides group travel dates with opportunities for students to travel together. Students may request alternate travel dates, however students traveling on alternate dates will probably not travel with other Rotary students.

Some exchanges may be proposed as "reverse exchanges" with the foreign students coming to the US or Canada for the first half of the exchange.

## 5.02 Application Process

The application process for short term exchange begins between September and January. The Short Term Exchange Program Application, Short Term Exchange Program Country Preference Form, and Short Term Host Family Applications are due to the local Rotary Club March 1st.

Submit an initial check for \$250 along with fully completed original signed Short Term Exchange Program Application and Country Preference Document to your local Rotary Club by March 1st.

Short term students, like long term students, apply through a local Rotary club. Short term applications are available on the Rotary D-5080 Youth Exchange web site: [www.rotary5080ye.org](http://www.rotary5080ye.org)

Clubs should notify short term applicants that completed applications with original signatures and color photographs must be submitted to the club by March 1st. Applicants should be encouraged to answer questions on the application completely and to follow the instructions carefully. Providing complete responses will help with the matching process.

After the Rotary club receives the completed application, a time and date is set for the club youth exchange chairman/committee to interview the student and parents.

Because Short Term Exchange is a family-to-family exchange, the Rotary club must visit each applicant's home to determine if his/her family is able to host the foreign student.

## 5.03 Criteria for Short Term Exchange

### Students:

1. Students must be at least 15 years old, and not more than 19 years old, when they go on exchange.
2. Students must complete applications and pay program fees by the deadline dates set by the sponsoring Rotary club and the District Youth Exchange Committee.
3. Students will be interviewed and approved by the sponsoring Rotary club.  
During the interview:
  - a. The student must convey to the interviewers that he/she is willing to learn about, and adapt to, a foreign family and culture.
  - b. The student must assure interviewers that he/she will devote the thirty days of the exchange spent at home to the visiting student:
    - No summer job
    - No leaving the student home while you go on dates, etc.
4. The student must attend the outbound orientation on the first weekend in May at Camp Lutherhaven near Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.
5. Outbound students must have a valid passport that does not expire prior to six months after the exchange period ends (February of the following year).
6. Students must agree to abide by all program rules and accept additional rules and guidelines set by the host parents, Rotary club and/or Rotary district.

### Parents:

1. Read and understand program rules.
2. Attend interview and allow Rotary members to visit your home.
3. Attend the orientation the first weekend in May.
4. Agree to host the foreign student for a period of thirty (30) days.
5. Agree to provide opportunities for the visiting student to experience things beyond everyday life. Activities might include camping, outdoor recreation, sightseeing, sporting events, tourist attractions, theater, museums, road trip, etc.
6. Make sure visiting student is taken to the airport on his/her departure day.

### Sponsoring Rotary Clubs:

1. Read manual section covering Short-Term Exchanges.
2. Distribute short-term brochures and applications beginning in September.
3. Collect completed applications by March 1<sup>st</sup>.
4. Provide a counselor for each short-term student and his/her family.
5. Interview applicants (students and parents). Visit the applicant's home to determine that the family is able to host a foreign student.
6. Invite the outbound student and his/her parents to visit your club prior to his/her departure.
7. Invite both students to visit your club during the time they are both in our district.

8. In the event the host family is unable to complete the thirty (30) days of hosting (due to illness or problems), the Rotary club must be able to provide an alternate host family for the foreign student.

## 5.04 Program Calendar

September-February	Clubs distribute program brochures and applications.
Early October	Clubs collect all applications/country preference documents. Clubs check applications are completed per instructions and complete club section. Interview short term applicants together with long term applicants.
November	District interviews for long term applicants and any short term applicants who have applied in time for this round of interviews.
January	Matching process with foreign districts begins.
March 1	Clubs collect fully completed applications/preference documents and Short Term Host Family Application along with \$250 US from each student and forward as instructed.
Early January	Clubs interview parents and visit applicant homes.
Mid-March	District interviews for short term applicants who have not already interviewed.
March/April	The Vice-Chair, Short-Term Exchanges notifies clubs of matches as they are confirmed. Students/families begin contact with foreign students/families.
1 <sup>st</sup> weekend in May	Students/Parents attend weekend orientation at Camp Lutherhaven and pay the final payment of \$250 US
Mid-June	Group travel students depart for thirty days in Europe or South America.
Mid-July	Group travel students and European or South American counterparts return from Europe or South America.
Mid-August	European or South American students depart for home.

## **5.05 Cost of the Program**

The cost of the Short Term Exchange Program is USD \$500.00. Half of the program fee is due March 1st and half is due at the outbound camp in May.

The program fee includes:

- Medical/travel insurance
- Orientation at Camp Lutherhaven
- Program materials (folders, shirt, pins, etc.)

### **Medical Insurance**

Medical insurance is required for all outbound and inbound students. The cost of insurance is included in the program fee. Inbound students will have their own insurance from their home country. Medical insurance will be procured by District 5080.

### **Other Costs**

There are other costs of participating in the program which are not included in the program fee above, e.g. airfare costs. Please refer to those costs outlined on [www.rotary5080ye.org](http://www.rotary5080ye.org) (on the Short Term Exchange page).

## **5.06 Responsibilities of the Rotary Counselor**

- Assist/counsel the student and his/her family during application process.
- Participate in the student interview and home visit.
- Make sure the student and parent(s) attend the outbound orientation.
- Invite the student and parents to attend a Rotary meeting prior to the student's departure. Provide two (2) club banners for the student to give the host family and host Rotary club.
- While the European or South American student is in our district, invite both students to attend a Rotary meeting to talk about their experiences.
- If the hosting family is unable to complete the thirty-day hosting period due to illness or problems, work with the members of the Rotary club to provide an alternate host family for the remaining period of time.

## 5.07 Program Rules and Conditions of Exchange

- 1) Obey the laws of the host country – If found guilty of violation of any law, student can expect no assistance from Rotary or their native country. Student will be returned home as soon as released by authorities.
- 2) The student may not possess or use illegal drugs. Medicine prescribed by a physician is allowed.
- 3) The student is not permitted to operate a motorized vehicle of any kind.
- 4) The illegal drinking of alcoholic beverages is expressly forbidden. Students who are of legal age in host country should refrain.
- 5) Stealing is prohibited. There are no exceptions.
- 6) Unauthorized travel is not allowed. Students must follow the travel rules of the host district.
- 7) The student must be covered by a health and life insurance policy agreeable to the hosting district.
- 8) The student must abide by the rules and conditions of exchange of the hosting district provided to you by the District Youth Exchange Committee.
- 9) The student must return home directly by a route mutually agreeable to the host district and student's parents.
- 10) The student shall have sufficient financial support to assure his/her well-being during the exchange. Any unusual costs relative to a student's early return home or other unusual costs shall be the responsibility of the student's own parents/guardians.
- 11) You will be under the hosting district's authority while you are an exchange student. Parents/guardians must avoid authorizing any extra activities directly to their son or daughter. The host club and District Youth Exchange Officers must authorize such activities. Relatives in the host country will have no authority over the student while they are in the program.

The specific and most current Program Rules and Conditions of Exchange are included in the Short Term Exchange Program Application and Country Preference form.

Also, please be aware that smoking is strongly discouraged while abroad and not permitted while in District 5080. You may have to explain US/Canadian attitudes about smoking to your European or South American visitor.



## 5.08 Frequently Asked Questions

**Q - Is this a mutual exchange?**

A – Yes, a D-5080 student will stay with a European or South American family for thirty days. When he/she returns, the European or South American “match” will stay with the D-5080 student’s family for thirty days.

**Q – Can we request a one-way exchange?**

A – No, Rotary District 5080 is not currently offering one-way exchanges.

**Q – Can a different family host the European or South American student?**

A – Not without a lot of special arrangements made by the local Rotary club.

**Q – May my student select which country to go to?**

A – A Country Preference Form is provided with the application. Students rank their preferences in numerical order. Every effort will be made to match a student with someone in his/her 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> choice country, but this cannot be guaranteed. Students should be willing to accept a match in any of the countries offered.

**Q – May I request which gender my student may exchange with?**

A – Yes, in fact we will obligate ourselves to your choice. The application form contains the following wording: “the family can host: boy / girl / either boy or girl” and you select one of the choices.

**Q – What are the host family obligations?**

A – In a nutshell, we expect our host families to entertain the European or South American student, to some extent, beyond the normal family activities. Room, board, meals and travel expenses incurred while the European or South American student is here are paid for by the host family. Special outings should also be provided.

**Q – What are the responsibilities of the local Rotary club?**

A – Rotary clubs are required to interview the student applicant and his/her parents. Clubs must visit the home of the applicant to determine that the family is able to host the foreign student.

Club officers must sign the application, witness signatures, and complete the club representative section where indicated.

The club provides a counselor for the outbound student and his/her family.

The club invites the outbound student and his/her parents to visit a club meeting prior to departure and invites both students to visit a club meeting during the time they are both in the district.

In the event that the host family is unable to complete the thirty-day hosting period due to illness or problems, the club must provide an alternate host family for the remainder of the European or South American student’s stay.

**Q – Are the student and his/her parents required to attend an orientation?**

A – Yes. The orientation is a weekend event the first weekend in May at Camp Lutherhaven, near Coeur d’Alene, Idaho. The student and at least one of his/her parents must attend the orientation.

The short term orientation is held in conjunction with the orientation for students and parents participating in the Long Term Exchange Program.

**Q – How much money should the student take on exchange?**

A – This will be decided by the student and his/her parents. It is recommended that the student take at least US\$150 for personal expenses. The host family will not be providing any personal spending money for the student.

**Q – Can my student depart from a different airport?**

A – We are asking that students depart from Spokane International Airport if at all possible. We want to have our students travel in a group, but we will try to plan itineraries that are convenient for students and their families.

**Q – My student has graduated from high school. May he/she still apply?**

A – Yes, as long as he/she meets the age requirements. (Cannot be older than 19 when he/she leaves on exchange.)

**Q – Can a student participate in this program more than once?**

A – Yes, and they may apply for the Long Term Exchange Program as long as they meet the age requirements of that program.
